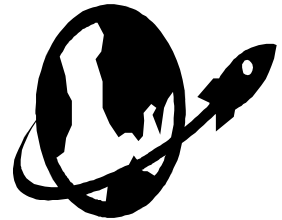

Boy Scout Centennial Celebration

- 1) Registration officially opens at midnight on Tuesday, June 1, 2010 on the Council Website, www.centralnccouncilbsa.com. All **registration and troop memorabilia orders** must be completed online by September 4, 2010. This event will be limited to the first 750 Scouts that are **registered and paid**. The cost of this Centennial Celebration is \$15.00 for each registered scout, leader, and volunteer staff.
- 2) A Volunteer Staff Form is included in this Celebration Guide for those that are willing to offer their services for the weekend. All volunteer staff should contact our Program Committee Chairman, Tim Agner, at tagner@stalite.com or 704-906-6037 as soon as possible. Volunteer Staff Forms are also available through the online registration process.
- 3) Registration cost for the weekend, includes 1 event patch and 1 Brown Sea Island Feast.
- 4) Check-in will begin on Friday, September 24, 2010 at 3:00 p.m. at the Log Cabin. **NO VEHICLES/TRAILERS** will be allowed in camp at any time, except for approved handicap transportation. All gear will need to be **BACKPACKED** into assigned camping areas, just like the early scouts did in 1910. Absolutely no one will be allowed to set up campsites before Friday's check-in time.
- 5) Parking will be at a premium for this event, so please carpool with as many as possible.
- 6) Friday, Saturday, and Sunday events will follow the schedule found in this Celebration Guide.
- 7) Troops will be responsible for providing all of their camping equipment, including tents, and food and drink (with the exception of the Brown Sea Island Feast on Saturday night).
- 8) The Central N.C. Council's group policy covers all B.S.A registered scouts and leaders. No additional insurance fees or proof of insurance will be necessary. All participants, scouts, and leaders will be required to have the **NEW MEDICAL FORM** (Form 34605, Parts A and C) **completed and in the possession of the Scoutmaster** during the Celebration. The new form is available at the Council Office and on the Council Website. It is also available at scouting.org/scoutsource/healthandsafety.
- 9) The Boy Scout Oath and Boy Scout Laws will be followed at all times. Violation of the rules of conduct unbecoming of a scout may lead to expulsion from camp.
- 10) The Boy Scouts of America 2-deep leadership policy will be observed at all times.
- 11) Campsites should follow low-impact camping guidelines and adhere to the campsite guidelines as closely as possible. Remember scouts **Leave No Trace!**
- 12) **If the burning ban** is not in effect, campfires will be permitted in the campsites. Dug fire pits are allowed if **Leave No Trace** remains at checkout. Fires must be attended at all times and completely extinguished before checking out on Sunday morning.
- 13) Personal sheath knives or fixed blade knives are not permitted.

- 14) Defacing of camp property, including living trees, may result in dismissal from camp with the repair cost settled before dismissal.
- 15) Radios, TV's, electronic games or other electric devices are not permitted.
- 16) Fireworks of any type are strictly prohibited.
- 17) Bicycles will not be allowed.
- 18) Only service animals will be allowed in camp. Pets are not allowed as per B.S.A Camp Policy.
- 19) Alcoholic beverages are not allowed on camp property or at B.S.A events. Possession will result in immediate expulsion from camp.
- 20) Illegal drugs are not allowed and will result in immediate dismissal and staff will notify local law enforcement officials immediately.
- 21) Camp Barnhardt is a tobacco free environment.
- 22) Quiet times (11:00 p.m.- 6:30 a.m.) shall be observed by everyone in their campsites.
- 23) No individual registrations will be allowed. All participants must be part of a troop/patrol.
- 24) All other B.S.A. policies will be observed during the celebration.

Be Prepared !

1. As with scouts in 1910, all patrols should consist of approximately 8 boys. All activities will be based on patrol units of 8 scouts.
2. Each boy will be expected to wear his uniform at all times during the event (except when in patrol campsite).
3. Each participant will need a 5 foot long wooden walking staff. This was a part of a 1910 era scout uniform.
4. Each participant will need a piece of rope suitable to complete one Square Lash.
5. Each patrol will need to be prepared to design and make a new patrol flag as assigned at check-in.
6. Each patrol will need to be prepared to build a fire with no matches or lighters, and boil water over an open fire.
7. Each patrol will need to have a Duty Roster, Menu, and a First Aid Kit present in their campsite.
8. Each participant will need pencil and paper.
9. The Trading Post and Snack Bar will be open Saturday from 8:30 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. and again after the campfire program until 10:30 p.m.
10. Troops need to bring a small item (5 x 5 x 5 inches or smaller) to be placed in a Time Capsule.

Campsite Checklist

- 1) Troop Campsites
 - a. Show considerations of terrain, safety, site assignment, and other relevant factors.
 - b. Each troop will be assigned a campsite area to utilize.
 - c. Tents need to be arranged by patrol.
 - d. Location of food storage, preparation, and cooking areas are essential.
 - e. Location and storage of fuels
 - f. Troop/Patrol identification
 - g. Posted in campsite:
 - 1) Menu for all meals
 - 2) Duty Roster
 - 3) Schedule of events
 - h. Please respect all troop and personal equipment of others.
- 2) Patrol Cooking
 - a. Food properly stored
 - b. Potable water storage
 - c. Cooking utensils properly stored
 - d. Campsite clean and free of food scraps and trash
 - e. Trash bags for disposal of trash and garbage
 - f. Troops will be required to pack out all trash and dispose of trash properly at the conclusion of the Celebration.
- 4) Patrol First Aid
 - a. First Aid Kit in plain view and accessible
- 5) Leave No Trace camping shall be observed during the Celebration.
- 6) Camp Inspectors may visit campsites at any times between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Saturday.

The History of Scouting Each troop is encouraged to create a historic display, showing scouting over the past 100 years. Patrols should utilize how Scouting has affected the world and how the world has affected Scouting over the past 100 years. These displays will be evaluated as part of the Spirit Competition. These exhibits will be near the Dining Hall and should be set up on Friday night.

Pioneering Display Each troop is encouraged to create an original static pioneering project for the display area. These projects will be evaluated as part of the spirit competition. These exhibits will be near the Dining Hall and should be set up on Friday night.

Midway Area The midway will be home to many different displays representing areas that impact our Scouting lives *Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow*.

Scout Spirit Competition Troops will be evaluated for Scout Spirit during the Celebration. There will be 3 parts to the competition which will include; 1) Pioneering Display, 2) History of Scouting Display, and 3) Uniforms and Patrol participation.

Patrols As patrols arrive for the Celebration, they will be assigned a new patrol name based on one of the original patrols. Each patrol will be given a flag blank to be decorated and carried during the Celebration. Each patrol will be responsible for supplying the materials to decorate the flag.
